### Memory Verse:

### Day 1

Read Leviticus 18 and 20. When God gave the Israelites these instructions, they were not doing any of these practices. By the time of King Manasseh (Josiah's grandfather) these practices were part of the Israelite culture. Summarize the list of practices that God said were defiling and abhorrent:

### Day 2

Read Leviticus 26. On a separate sheet of paper, answer the following:

1. Summarize the things God said He would do if His people turned away from obeying His commands.
2. Why does God say He is sending His discipline in stages?  
(note v. 23, 27)
3. What was God's intention through His judgment? (note v. 30, 34, 43)
4. After all those horrible things would happen, what was their hope? (note v. 40.44)
5. What was God's desire in v. 45?
6. In what verse did Israel agree to these terms and conditions?

### Day 3

Read Deuteronomy 9.

What would the Israelites be tempted to think when they got to the Land of Canaan and won battles? (v. 3)

What was the real reason God was dispossessing the nations of Canaan?

How many times in the chapter does God tell the Israelites that He is not dispossessing the Canaanites because of their righteousness?

**Read Deuteronomy 28. This is likely the section of the scroll read to King Josiah.

**Read Exodus 34:6-7 and Jeremiah 25-28.**
